

Doterius Molrok alias Michael Ritzmann is an contemporary artist based in Germany, raised in the former GDR.

After receiving his highschool-degree he studied philosophies, psychology and childhood education at the university of Erfurt in 2003 but later abandoned the studies to focus on his artistic career

Dr.Molrok's" started working artisticly in 1994 with illegal graffiti which transformed in beeing a full time artist later on.

In 1999, he was introduced to the "Künstlerwerkstätten" in Erfurt, which he still uses frequently for his enamel-works.

In 2017, after beeing an independent artist for almost 2 decades, he matriculated at Bauhaus university Weimar for an diploma of art focusing on sculpture with Prof. Jana Gunstheimer & Prof. Björn Dahlem.

Dr. Molrok's creative oeuvre is distinguished by its boundless diversity, spanning across an array of artistic genres, including fine arts, painting, sculpture, photography, photographic processing techniques, production design, gold and silversmithing, props, and facade/mural design. His artistic versatility is a testament to the constant exploration of artistic frontiers, characteri-

stic of innovative artists throughout history.

However, the essence of Michael Ritzmann's alter ego, Dr. Molrok, extends beyond the mere range of mediums. It encapsulates the notion of 'professional lunatism, a concept that melds professionalism with audacious, imaginative artistic pursuits. In the context of art history, this concept aligns with a longstanding tradition of artists who defied convention, pushing the boundaries of their craft in unconventional and thought-provoking ways.

Recent series

1."Recontextualizing Readymades"

The sculptures in this series represent a significant departure from traditional sculptural practices, as they engage with the concept of the readymade and incorporate geometric metal shapes as transformative elements. By employing this unique approach, the artworks challenge established notions of artistic creation and offer a fresh perspective on the intersection between found objects and sculptural form.

The readymade, a term famously coined by Marcel Duchamp in the early 20th century, refers to the use of preexisting objects as art. In this series, the artists embrace the readymade ethos by selecting everyday objects from our material culture and recontextualizing them through the addition of geometric metal shapes. These sculptures embody a spirit of appropriation and intervention, provoking contemplation on the nature of art, originality, and the role of the artist.

The geometric metal shapes serve as both structural and conceptual elements within the sculptures. Carefully chosen and meticulously integrated, these shapes act as visual connectors, bridging the gap between the found objects and the transformative artistic intervention. The rigid lines, angles, and forms of the metal shapes create a captivating juxtaposition with the organic and often mundane nature of the readymades. This contrast generates a dynamic tension that invites viewers to reconsider the inherent qualities and symbolic potential of both materials.

By incorporating geometric metal shapes, the artists engage with the rich history of abstraction and minimalism. These movements sought to distill artistic expression down to its essential forms and elements. In this context, the geometric metal shapes function as visual anchors, emphasizing the inherent geometric qualities of the readymades and lending them a newfound sense of order and unity. The resulting sculptures embody a harmonious dialogue between the found objects and the abstract geometric language, blurring the boundaries between the functional and the aesthetic.

Moreover, the sculptures prompt a reevaluation of our relationship with the objects that surround us. The transformative intervention of the geometric metal shapes not only alters the physical appearance of the readymades but also challenges our perception of their purpose and significance. By isolating and reconfiguring these objects, the artists invite us to examine the hidden narratives and cultural associations embedded within them, encouraging a critical reflection on consumerism, materiality, and waste.

In conclusion, the sculptures in this collection represent a compelling exploration of the readymade tradition, reinvigorated by the addition of geometric metal shapes. They offer a contemporary interpretation of Duchamp's groundbreaking concept while simultaneously engaging with the legacy of abstraction and minimalism. Through the fusion of found objects and transformative intervention, these sculptures spark a profound dialogue on the nature of art, material culture, and our evolving relationship with the objects that populate our world.





"Broken Harmony"

Dr. Molrok's sculptures represent a striking exploration of the neofuturistic movement, utilizing sheet metal as the primary medium. These sculptures are meticulously cut, bent, welded, and spray-painted by hand, resulting in intricate wall sculptures that embody a captivating fusion of form, movement, and theme. Dr. Molrok's artistic vision is rooted in the concept of "broken harmony," evident in the intentional inclusion of subtle glitches in color and shapes within the optical approach.

The use of sheet metal as a sculptural medium is significant, as it allows Dr. Molrok to achieve a balance between strength and malleability. The sheets are expertly manipulated, with precise cuts and bends that give rise to intricate, three-dimensional forms. The resulting sculptures possess a sense of dynamism and energy, reflecting the neofuturistic ethos that embraces technological advancement, movement, and a visionary aesthetic.

The handcrafted nature of Dr. Molrok's process adds a layer of intimacy and meticulousness to each sculpture. The artist's personal touch is evident in the weld marks, showcasing the dedication and skill required to bring these metal fragments together into cohesive compositions. The spray-painted surfaces further enhance the visual impact of the sculptures, allowing for the exploration of a diverse range of colors and textures.

Dr. Molrok incorporates deliberate glitches in both color and shape. These subtle imperfections disrupt the expected harmony of the sculptures, injecting an element of unpredictability and visual tension. This thematic exploration of "broken harmony" challenges conventional notions of perfection and symmetry, inviting viewers to contemplate the inherent beauty found within imperfections and disruptions.

By engaging with the neofuturistic movement, Dr. Molrok's sculptures contribute to a broader artistic conversation that reimagines the future through the lens of technology, innovation, and fluid forms. The interplay between precision and spontaneity, created through the meticulous manipulation of sheet metal and the intentional glitches.

Dr. Molrok's artworks beckon viewers to embark on a journey of visual discovery, where the juxtaposition of strength and fragility, order and disruption, converge to form a new understanding of harmony. The intentional glitches serve as reminders of the complexity and imperfections inherent in our human experience, prompting contemplation on the delicate balance between chaos and order. 
spraypainted steelsculpture 100x130x30cm 2022

goldpigmented steelsculpture on wooden plate 170x150x50cm 2020












